## Message from Cathy Cash, CEO

Dear Friends,

I was 27 years old when I went to work for GCCLC. I had taught special education for 5 years and had two children, ages 2 and 4. Little did I know that I was soon to be in a situation where 18- to 60-year-old adults would call me Momma Cash. At first, I was a little bit embarrassed, and not really sure what to say to them. As time progressed, I got older and more experienced and I came to appreciate that they were expressing their love, but even more importantly, they were expressing their faith in me. Many of the people we accepted into our program in the 1980s were people who had very little or no family involvement. The early days were tough, but we stuck it out together, through good times and bad and we

made it work. Not only did they come to know they could count on us, we came to understand we could count on them, too. Our staff and clients grew close to one another and over time, we learned that caring about someone went both ways. To our surprise, we had created a family.

Fortunately, our society has evolved, and young children with disabilities stay with their families and receive their education and prescribed therapy within the public school system. However, like all children they, **too**, reach an age when they wish to

their lives. Their parents are aging and need to prepare them for a time when the parents will no longer be in the picture. But every momma wants to know her child is moving into an environment where he or she will be not only cared for, but cared about, as well. It is our job to continue to focus on making GCCLC that kind of place. We take great pride in making mommas feel comfortable enough to leave their children in our hands, whether they are 18 and coming out of high school or 62 and coming out of SORC. All mommas are special, but mommas of children with disabilities are really a special kind of special. So when one of my clients yells across the workshop floor or sees me at an activity and calls me Momma Cash, I feel extra special, too.
